The lamp and the book



In 1904 "Culture for Service" was made the motto of Goshen College, after the term was used by then-president Noah E. Byers (1903-1913). At a traditional graduation week ceremony carried out at least by the early 1920s, the graduating senior class solemnly passed the actual book and lamp to the juniors. Found in the college seal, the book symbolizes the importance of the written word, especially holy Scripture. The lighted lamp represents the light of learning that, in a world of darkness, pushes back the darkness.

Goshen College is a place of light and of enlightenment. Signing the Goshen College book is a tradition that links generations of alumni in the spirit of "Culture for Service" and extends the light of learning to future students.

Mukarabe Makinto-Inandava



A native of Burundi, East Africa, and an advocate for issues challenging developing countries, Mukarabe Makinto-Inandava is an ordained minister and a co-founder of Amahoro International, a faith-based organization. She serves on the executive committee for the North American Mission Fellowship (NAMEF) and is a liaison between the Mennonite Church USA First Generation Immigrant Churches initiatives and immigrant churches within the Pacific Southwest Mennonite Conference.

Prior to coming to the United States, Makinto-Inandava worked to meet the significant needs in several of Africa's war-torn regions. She worked for the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID) and the Peace Corps in Burundi, and then after the Rwandan genocide she served with the United Nations World Food Program (WFP) in Kenya and Rwanda. She became a United Nations volunteer to Madagascar in charge of an education and nutrition development project for children.

She then became an advocate on the international level on such social issues as poverty and HIV/AIDS facing female orphans in Africa, serving on a committee for the Millennium Forum in 2000, and speaking before the General Assembly and the World Economic Forum.

Makinto-Inandava received a bachelor's degree from the University of Bujumbura and master's degrees in administration of public and health administration at Portland (Ore.) State University, and is a certified interpreter in four languages. She resides in Rancho Palos Verdes, Calif., is married to George Makinto and is the mother of three young sons.

Some December 2008 graduates have chosen to participate in these exercises. Inclusion in this publication may not be construed as documentation of completion of degree requirements. Certification of the conferral of a degree is by receipt of a diploma or official transcript noting degree completion.

Two degrees are conferred. Those with majors in Nursing, Organizational Management or Organizational Leadership receive the Bachelor of Science degree. All others receive the Bachelor of Arts degree.

Following each name is the field of study being completed by the student. Use of the diagonal (/) indicates that the two fields are a double major program with two equal areas of concentration. Areas in which a minor will be completed are indicated by *italics*.

Graduation Honors

Graduation honors are awarded to students who have earned a cumulative GPA of 3.6 or above with no grade lower than a "C" at Goshen College. Students in the traditional baccalaureate degree program must have completed a minimum of 48 graded hours at Goshen College. Students in the Adult Degree Completion Program must have completed at least 40 graded hours at Goshen College. Honors are reflective of grade point averages as of December 2007 and are subject to change with the addition of grades in later terms. The specific honor is indicated with an asterisk after the name.

The academic procession

The history of academic dress reaches back into the earliest days of the oldest universities. The costumes and colors, trimmings and patterns you will see are all traditional and interpret both the degree and field of learning. The bachelor's gown has pointed sleeves; the master's gown has an oblong sleeve. The doctor's gown has bell-shaped sleeves decorated with chevrons of velvet.

The colors you will see in the hoods and gowns of GC faculty represent the various fields in which the degrees were taken: apricot – nursing; brown – fine arts; citron – social work; crimson – journalism; dark blue – philosophy; yellow – science; green – medicine; lemon yellow – library science; blue – education; pink – music; purple – law; sage green – physical education; salmon pink – public health; scarlet – theology; brown – business; white – arts and humanities; and orange – engineering.

The hoods, differing in length for the three degrees, are lined with the official colors of the university or college conferring the degree. Hoods are edged and bound with velvet of the color appropriate for the degree.

A note about photography:

Arrangements have been made for a professional photographer to take a picture of each graduate as he or she receives a diploma. Color proofs of these photos will be mailed one week after graduation. Details have been given to the graduates. This will ensure that all families will have a picture of their graduate receiving a diploma.
